PGA Hosts AT&T Pro-Am in Monterey Bay

The PGA Tour traveled to Monterey Bay for the AT&T Pro-Am golf tournament on February 1st-4th. The Pro-Am is the second signature event of the 2024 season bringing the best players on the PGA Tour to compete. The players have quite the incentive to perform at their highest capability as the tournament payout purse was 20 million dollars. The tournament was held at two of the most notorious golf courses in the country Pebble Beach and SpyGlass. The tournament got underway with an eventful start as Thomas Detry shot 63 (-9) and led the tournament by 1 stroke to Patrick Cantlay. Thomas Detry's lead slowly started to vanish as he struggled the second day shooting 70 (-2). The world rankings number one player, Scottie Scheffler shot his lowest round of the tournament in the second round carding a 64 (-8), putting him at the top of the leaderboard. Conditions during the second round made it very difficult for players to score well as they battled Mother Nature's wind all day. After the second round play concluded two well-known names in the golf world led the tournament, Scottie Scheffler and Ludvig Aberg at (-11).



Wyndham Clark Captures his Third PGA Tour Victory

The third round attention was drawn to Wyndham Clark as he was 6 strokes back from the leaders after getting off to a slow start to the tournament. Wyndham Clark started his front 9 off with 2 eagles and 4 birdies carding a 28 (-6) putting him right up with the leaders. After Wyndham Clark shot a 28 on the front nine he was pursuing history with the lowest round ever shot at Pebble Beach as well as trying to win a golf tournament. The lowest round record at Pebble Beach during a PGA tournament was 62 (-8). Golf fans tuned in from all over the world to watch history unfold as he was on track to break history. As Wyndham Clark made it to the closing stretch he needed to finish 2 under par through his last 5 holes to capture history. Wyndham Clark needed to make a par on the last hole to break the course record as well as needing a birdie to move to solo first in the tournament. With everything on the line, Wyndham Clark was able to leave himself an eagle putt for a chance at 59 which only 12 players in the history of the PGA Tour have recorded. Wyndham Clark wasn't able to make his putt for 59 although he made his birdie putt for 60 (-12) and the solo lead. Unfortunately, the fourth round was canceled due to weather conditions which resulted in a 54-hole golf tournament. Wyndham Clark was able to capture his third win on tour with an unforgettable round as he broke history on one of the most prestigious golf courses in the world.
